Our COAlition Featuring...The Ocean Congress



The 2008 Ocean Congress, held in March, brought COA's Participating Organizations and other groups working on ocean pollution issues together to discuss current threats and develop a plan for collective action. COA partnered with Gateway National Recreation Area -Sandy Hook for the event.

Nearly 60 people representing over 30 groups attended the successful event. US Rep. Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-D-6) reviewed federal legislation for the ocean, including the Clean Ocean Zone. Tim Dillingham from the American Littoral Society, reviewed state legislative actions, and spoke as a panelist during the policy session. As keynote speaker, Brian Thompson of WNBC-NY provided a lively discussion about his perspective on media and environmental issues.

During the policy panel session, Suzanne Golas, csjp, of WATERSPIRIT presented the "Big Picture" and how local action has global impacts, while **Tony** MacDonald of the Urban Coast Institute outlined an 8-point agenda for coastal protection. Dr. Mike Kennish of Rutgers University and John Tiedemann of Monmouth University presented new scientific information about the health of offshore and nearshore ocean waters during the science session. In the third session, Dr. Bill Rosenblatt of Surfrider Foundation provided ideas for motivating and activating citizens for a purpose, while Michelle Knapik of the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation reviewed a strategy to improve advocacy messaging.

While much progress has been made as a coalition, congress participants agreed that much work remains to protect the ocean from pollution.

COMPANY ATTEMPTS TO SILENCE NJ, AGAIN Fishing Grounds Threatened

The Atlantic Sea Island Group (ASIG) continues its relentless pursuit to exclude New Jersey from the review process for the company's proposed massive industrial island to import liquefied natural gas (LNG). As reported in last month's Clean Ocean Advocate. ASIG filed a lawsuit against the US Maritime Administration (MARAD) and the US Department of Transportation to take away "adjacent coastal state" (ACS) status from NJ. With this status, NJ has a seat at the table to review the application and has veto power over the project.

The State of New Jersey filed a "Motion to Intervene" so that it can be a party to the lawsuit and protect its rights. In response, the company filed to oppose NJ's request to be party to the lawsuit. MARAD has filed paperwork arguing that the court should throw-out this lawsuit.

Citizens' Right to Know

As a result of Clean Ocean Action (COA) filing a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) Request, documents and information related to ASIG's attempts to strip NJ of its voice in the project are now available at www.regulations.gov under Docket #28535. COA is reviewing the newly posted information to ensure all relevant materials are publicly available. Interestingly, COA learned from these new materials that US Senator Inhofe (R-OK) and US Rep. Coble (R-NC) wrote letters to MARAD supporting one of ASIG's arguments against NJ having a role in reviewing the project.

Impacts to Fishing Grounds

The NJ Division of Fish & Wildlife Bureau of Marine Fisheries contacted fishermen to gather information about offshore fishing grounds in preparation for filing their Motion to Intervene. Jim Lovgren, a third generation commercial fisherman and member of the Fishermen's Dock Cooperative in Point Pleasant Beach, outlined in a letter the important role that Cholera Banks plays as a fisheries habitat. This same area is where ASIG proposes to dump 16 million tons of material to build their 116-acre industrial island. Lovgren also exposed the statistical flaws in a study, paid-for by ASIG, which the company is using to say there will be minimal harm from the project.

Knowing When to Surf & Swim: The Beach Protection Act The Beach Protection Act is now gaining attention



in the US Senate. This proposed law expands protection of public health by requiring monitoring of beach water quality and notification to the public when health-based pollutant limits are exceeded. US Senator Frank Lautenberg (D-NJ) introduced a bill to amend the BEACH Act to strengthen it and require newer rapid testing methods, among other changes. Rapid testing would ensure that the public is notified in a guicker time frame when it is unhealthy to swim, surf,

or otherwise recreate in the ocean. In addition, it would also require states to undertake source tracking and prevention efforts to find and remedy the sources of ocean pollution.

While COA generally supports the bill, COA is working with Lautenberg's office to strengthen certain provisions. New revisions to the bill will include a requirement that the US Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) approve rapid testing methods by a certain date to ensure all coastal states begin using such methods. Also, Sen. Lautenberg is working with Sen. Voinovich (R-OH) to help move the bill forward with bi-partisan support.

US Senators from NJ Help Defeat New Offshore Oil & Gas Drilling



Last month, US Senators Robert Menendez (D-NJ) and Frank Lautenberg (D-NJ) lead the fight against a surprise amendment that would have taken the first step toward allowing new oil and natural gas drilling off the US coast. The amendment to the US Senate Budget Bill. proposed by US Senator Lamar Alexander (R-TN), would have given a "green light" to Virginia to drill off its coast.

COA commends New Jersey's US Senators for defending the ocean. Both Senators expressed concerns for the Jersev shore, which could be impacted by oil and gas activities and spills off Virginia's coast.

"The environment and economy of the Jersey Shore would have been directly threatened by this plan, so we stood up against it," said Senator Menendez. "It was a reckless plan to feed our nation's addiction to oil that posed not only short-term threats, but also could have led us down a slippery slope that ends in drilling up and down the east coast. This problem arises because we are relying exclusively on oil. Instead, we need to become a more energy efficient nation and we need to develop alternative fuels. This was an important victory for New Jersey in the Senate today."

"Drilling so close to the NJ shoreline is no solution to our nation's energy crisis. Oil drilling would threaten the natural beauty and health of our shores and wildlife, as well as the millions of people who live and work nearby. We need to put NJ ahead of the interests of Big Oil," said Senator Lautenberg.

COA joined a dozen regional and national organizations in a letter to Senators, urging them to vote against the amendment. The Senators rejected the amendment with a vote of 47 to 51. US Senators Menendez and Lautenberg, as well as US Senators Hillary Clinton (D-NY) and Charles Schumer (D-NY), all voted against the amendment.

To Fertilize or Not to Fertilize: How to Help Barnegat Bay

The Nitrogen Pollution Action Project began in 2007 to educate citizens. municipalities, and elected officials about solutions to the excess nitrogen polluting

nitrogen entering Barnegat Bay is from fertilizer runoff.

Barnegat Bay. Each year, hundreds of tons of nitrogen **About 30% of polluting** enter the bay and disrupt its unique ecosystem by reducing the amount of oxygen and sunlight available for fish, shellfish, and underwater plants. Recent research shows that about 30% of polluting nitrogen enters the bay from fertilizer runoff. Therefore, citizens within the

Barnegat Bay watershed, which includes Ocean County and parts of Monmouth County, must be mindful about the amount and type of fertilizer applied to their yards. As part of the Action Project, COA is developing a "Barnegat Bay Buddy Certification" program that guides individuals on how to take action to reduce nitrogen pollution in Barnegat Bay.

Getting ready to dive! Northern Gannet, Morus bassanus

The February Creature was the **Northern Gannet**. With a wingspan of up to two meters, it is the largest seabird in the North Atlantic. To gather food, this creature makes spectacular dives into the ocean from heights up to 40 meters, and can reach undersea depths of approximately 20 meters by using its wings and feet to swim. In the early spring, these birds will migrate to their mating grounds in Canada. Congratulations to Julie Todd of Brick, NJ, for being selected from a pool of correct entries.

April Creature: This spring, just as they have done for the past 200 million years, this gentle creature will gather along bay beaches in this region to mate. As they emerge from the muddy bay bottoms where they spend most of their lives, they are recognized by their spiny tail and helmet-shaped body (pictured right). Thanks to the American Littoral Society and NJ Audubon Society, this creature has recently caught the attention of the NJ State Legislature, and

The Big Picture: Humans' Impacts on the World's Oceans



According to the researchers with the US National Center for Ecological Analysis and Synthesis, humans have exacted a much heavier toll on the seas than initially thought. The first global map of humans' impacts on marine ecosystems revealed that almost half of the oceans have been badly damaged by humanity. Funded by the

US National Science Foundation, the research shows that 41 percent of the oceans have been affected strongly by 17 human activities. Humans have left only four percent of the world's oceans pristine.

Climate change has had the greatest impact, particularly through rising sea temperatures and its effect of acidifying the oceans. Also, researchers say continental shelves and slopes proved to be the most heavily affected areas, especially along densely populated coasts. The research shows that the entire East Coast has been heavily impacted.

While the picture painted by the research is grim, researchers said it could be reversed by urgent action. Let's get to work!
