TOUR FOR THE SHORE 2012

Prior to the Memorial Day weekend, the "unofficial" start of summer, Clean Ocean Action (COA) and its coalition members -- from South Jersey to the East End of Long Island -- announced an unprecedented bi-state, multi-organizational campaign to raise awareness for the Clean Ocean Zone or "COZ" that will run from August 10th to 24th, 2012. The **Tour for** the Shore 2012 is a 15-day tour along hundreds of miles of beaches with rallies and tour stops in nine coastal counties, and dozens of towns.



As part of the tour, ocean advocate and paddling enthusiast Margo Pellegrino will travel by outrigger canoe along the shoreline, while COA's own Coastal Policy Attorney **Sean Dixon** hits the pavement on a bike. Friends and supporters of a clean ocean are invited to join them by road or by sea as they progress up the coast. Rallies, action tables, and beach teams will be held along the way in every coastal district, where citizens, businesses, groups, and elected leaders will be urged to participate and support the initiative. COA is calling on the public to "Get in Motion for the Ocean."

The tour is scheduled to take place during the peak of the shore's tourism season, providing the coalition the opportunity to reach tens of thousands of people with one message: "The time is now for the Clean Ocean Zone." The tour kicks-off on Friday, August 10th in Cape May, heading up the coast to Manhattan for Surfers' Environmental Alliance's SEApaddleNYC on Friday, August 17th, and heading along the South Shore of Long Island to finish at Montauk Point on Friday, August 24th with the Concerned Citizens of Montauk and a Long Island "Century" Bike Ride for the Ocean.



Seismic Blasting in the Atlantic: Public Comment Period Extended

COA has been challenging – loudly – a plan by the Obama Administration's Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) to open up the Atlantic Ocean to a decade of seismic surveys. These surveys send powerful soundwaves deep below the seafloor in an attempt to locate oil and gas reserves. The deafening blasts threaten marine life (from whales to shellfish), and will be detrimental to our NY/NJ diving, boating, tourism, and fishing economies.

COA teamed-up with environmental groups across the nation to organize a coordinated response. COA is working with people from around the NY/NJ Bight to get our state elected officials to take a stand against these surveys and safeguard our ocean's health.

Thanks to US Representatives Frank Pallone, Jr. (D-6) and Rush Holt (D-12), BOEM extended the comment period to July 2. Fighting Fracking for Natural Gas

Regional advocates are gearing-up for a fight against the dumping of wastewater from "hydro-fracking" operations into our streams, estuaries, and oceans via wastewater treatment plants. "Fracking" for natural gas involves sending millions of gallons of chemically-treated water deep underground to break up rock formations and release trapped gas. This water – which can contain a dangerous chemical cocktail – in many cases spills into the waterways near production sites in states like Pennsylvania and Ohio. Recently, there has been a huge up-tick in wastewater from fracking, which has forced these energy companies to look for a place to "dispose" of this waste; they centered their targets on NY/NJ sewage treatment plants.

Disposing these chemicals in our water treatment plants is very dangerous because the chemicals in the water in many cases cannot be "treated," so they just pass through the plant and into our waters and oceans. Each gallon of water delivered to these plants contains a different deadly cocktail of toxins, making it nearly impossible to plan meaningful treatment steps. COA is working with safe water, safe community, and public health groups to make sure these chemicals stay out of our waters and ocean. Advocating NJ's Fertilizer Law

Recently, COA's Staff Scientist Heather Saffert, Ph.D. presented on the New Jersey Fertilizer Law at a New England Interstate Water Pollution Control Commission (NEIWPCC) conference on nonpoint source pollution. Saffert reviewed the history and requirements of NJ law and presented some of the challenges in its development and implementation.

The meeting was also useful to learn about nonpoint source issues and solutions, including the University of New Hampshire's stormwater studies. The UNH-designed gravel wetlands stormwater basin that remove nitrogen is being used as a model for retrofit projects in the Barnegat Bay watershed in NJ. Also, New York City initiated over 30 pilot projects using green infrastructure to reduce stormwater and combined sewer overflows (CSOs). Most of these monitored projects have been effective at reducing stormwater.

A Coastal Assessment of Seafloor Life

Rutgers University released the most comprehensive study of the ocean's benthic life along the Jersey Shore done to date. This study documented the numbers, types, and distribution of benthic sea life, animals that live in the sandy seafloor, including clams, worms (see left photo), snails, and other critters. Scientists cataloged over 270 different kinds of animals (113,177 critters total) from samples within the first three nautical miles of shore (the study's geographic extent). An average of 432 animals per sampling station was found in 2007, and 1,321 in 2009.

There have been concerns about seasonal low "Dissolved Oxygen" (DO) levels in coastal waters – the source of oxygen for sea life underwater – and its impacts. The study, conducted in 2007 and 2009, provides an encouraging snapshot of benthic animal life. Average DO levels were 6.2 mg/L in 2007 and 4.9 mg/L in 2009. Very low DO levels (less than 2 mg/L) were not observed, and healthy, long-lived critters were found along the shore. The community structure (abundance, diversity, etc.) – which can tell much about the health of an ecosystem - was found to be influenced by natural sources of variation, including depth, sediment type, and levels of organics. While the shore showed strong levels of sea life, a few areas were identified in 2009 as potentially showing signs of degradation that merit further monitoring. Low DO levels remain a concern, as do the potential influence of toxins that were not evaluated due to funding limitations.

The data generated has also been used to develop a new index, or measuring toolsystem that once finalized can be used for future monitoring and as a model for determining the health of similar coastal areas.

Ongoing comprehensive assessments of sea life in nearshore and deeper ocean waters are critical to understanding human impacts on marine life, and efforts should continue to limit and reduce pollution to the ocean. See COA's blog for more details.

Waiver Rule Lawsuit

Recently, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) adopted a "Waiver Rule" that would give DEP authority to let permit applicants (in over a hundred programs) avoid complying fully with environmental and public health protection regulations. With dozens of other environmental, public health, faith, and community organizations, COA joined a lawsuit against DEP to fight this Waiver Rule. Led by lawyers from the Columbia University Law School, this coalition hopes to defeat the Waiver Rule in court before August 1 -- the date DEP said it will begin accepting applications for waivers. This rule rolls back decades of carefully-crafted environmental and public health protections.

Student Scientists for a Day

On May 15 and 16, over 400 middle school students and teachers from 18 schools in northern and central New Jersey were scientists for a day at COA's 24th Annual **Spring Student Summit** at Sandy Hook. Students participated in six hands-on learning activities, which included live horseshoe crabs (right), identifying seashells, studying invertebrates (below), observing a model of nonpoint source pollution, and learning the lethal effects of litter on the marine environment. Students from the Marine Academy of Science and Technology, a Monmouth County vocational high school, served as peer teachers at the activity workstations.





In addition, naturalists and other education professionals lead students in twelve field activities throughout the park. Students used seine nets to collect and identify common marine species of Sandy Hook Bay and learned about key bird species and the important role of Sandy Hook in bird migration. Students participated in a beach cleanup, tested water quality,

learned fishing & surfing techniques, and traversed trails with park naturalists. Special thanks to **Kathleen Gasienica** for her enlightening horseshoe crab lecture. Waves of thanks to the Gateway National Recreation Area - Sandy **Hook** for providing the space for the day's activities.
