#### What Is Marine Debris?



Marine debris is "any persistent solid material that is manufactured or processed and directly or indirectly, intentionally or unintentionally, disposed of or abandoned into the marine environment or the Great Lakes."



#### Sources



#### Ocean-based

- Fishing operations
- Derelict and abandoned boats/vessels
- Offshore industry (e.g. aquaculture; oil rigs)

#### **Land-based**

- Littering
- Storm drains
- Illegal dumping
- Accidental or storm-related movement from land (wind, hurricanes, flooding)





Mitigation options:

Reduce plastic in waste stream Improve solid infrastructure Increase capture


6,350-245,000 metric tons\*\*

Estimated mass of plastic waste floating at the ocean surface

#### **Impacts**

From reports in the United States, at least 115 marine species are impacted by entanglement, including mammals, turtles, birds, fish and crabs. World wide, the number tops 200.






Most entanglement reports in the United States involve northern fur seals, Hawaiian monk seals, and sea turtles.





#### **Impacts**

26 marine species, including toothed whales, manatees, and multiple seal species, as well as <u>all</u> sea turtle species, have been confirmed to ingest marine debris




